## "Help spread the true Power of Oldness"

### "Oldness is everywhere – if you are lucky it can happen to you!"

The Hon Susan Ryan AO, Age Discrimination Commissioner and Acting Disability Discrimination Commissioner and Senator Eric Abetz, the Minister for Employment jointly launched a new campaign at the Human Rights Commission on Monday 18<sup>th</sup> August. **The Power of Oldness** campaign celebrates older Australians and is a call to action to the community to address the problems of age discrimination.

A new video is part of the campaign and is particularly aimed at young people and employers. In highlighting in a light hearted way, the value of older workers; the video exposes the stark difference between the skills and strengths mature workers offer employers and organisations, in comparison with the discrimination they face when trying to gain or maintain jobs.

Senator Abetz describes the video as; "An active, pacy and poignant presentation, which juxtaposes reality and perceptions about the value of older workers, to people of all ages throughout Australia."



Commissioner Ryan described "Oldness" as; "A potential treasure trove for the whole community and for the economy", but warns that we need to make some big changes in community attitudes and business strategies very quickly, in order to liberate this inherent value. "The Power of Oldness campaign will, we hope, prod everyone to recognise and act to stop age discrimination."

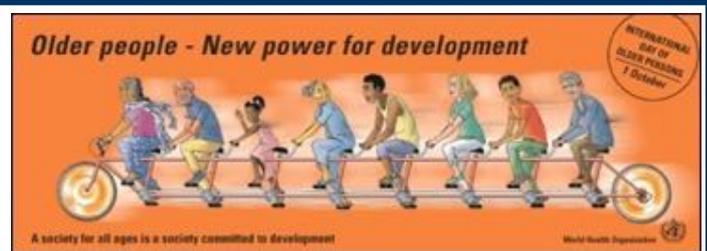

**Stefan Avgoustakis** works as a Security Architect at Cisco Systems in their Sydney Office. His talk will be called, ***Securing the Internet of Things (IoT)***. By 2020, more than 50 billion things will connect to the Internet—seven times our human population. Some examples are wearable health and performance monitors, connected vehicles, smart grids, smart TVs, smart fridges and connected manufacturing, like 3D Printing. A definition of this Internet of Things (IoT) is hard to pin down, (*see below*) but it is certainly obvious it will revolutionize the way we work, live, play, and learn.

## **IoT - About the Internet of Things**

These days in the world of IT it is almost impossible to keep up with the plethora of acronyms or to discover what concept or technology these suddenly popular terms describe. In searching for a layman's guide to the meaning of IoT (the Internet of Things) it is interesting to read a white paper, ***"The Internet of Things - How the Next Evolution of the Internet Is Changing Everything"*** authored in 2011 by Dave Evans from Cisco.

The paper quotes the Cisco Internet Business Group (IBSG) as stating; "IoT is simply the point in time when more 'things or objects' were connected to the internet than the number of people on the planet."

"Cisco IBSG estimates IoT was 'born' sometime between 2008 and 2009. Cisco

IBSG predicts there will be 25 billion devices connected to the Internet by 2015 and 50 billion by 2020." There are around 7.3 billion people in the world today.

The white paper asks us to; "Consider that IoT represents the next evolution of the Internet, taking a huge leap in its ability to gather, analyse, and distribute data that we can turn into information, knowledge and ultimately, wisdom. ## Welcome to the Windsor Senior Computer Hub

**ASCCA** is pleased to welcome the **Senior Computer Hub Broadband Kiosk** at the **Windsor Community Precinct, Riverside, Tasmania**, to the Australian Seniors Computer Clubs Association. West Tamar Council community development officer Ixa de Haan said that the area has a positive ageing strategy in place and the hub is a part of this strategy. Ms. De Haan said; *"Research has found the thing older people want most out of technology is connecting with family members over Facebook, Skype and emails."* Some specially trained year nine students from Launceston Christian School are helping other volunteers to teach at the kiosk which is part of the Government's Broadband for Seniors initiative.

Riverside is near Launceston in the beautiful Tamar Valley and it is great place to live or to visit. The Colonial Settlements in the Valley date back over 200 years and there were Indigenous Communities living in the area long before colonial discovery. There are some beautiful National Trust Properties to visit and National Parks and gardens to explore. There are interesting museums - and for wine and food lovers there is a heritage wine trail to follow. It almost seems a shame to stay indoors with places like the Cataract Gorge Reserve to investigate.
