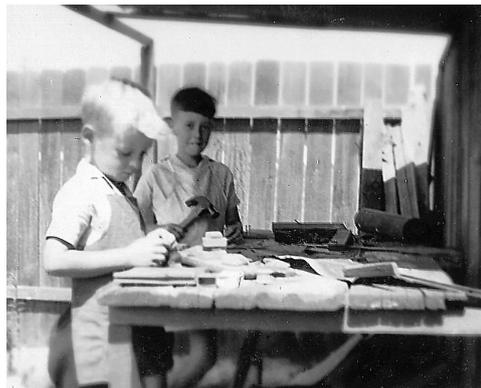
Windows 10 Trainers Workshop - 2 x 2 hours on one day at ASCCA For ASCCA club trainers only

An ASCCA member - a man in his mid seventies - reminiscing about his childhood interest in trying to understand all about radio and other technology, recently talked of the passionate interest he shared with his brother in building cats whisker crystal sets and all kinds of little projects in hobby magazines of the time.



He recalled that finding materials for these projects was really difficult - during and after the war - so he and his brother had to be innovative and very resourceful and absolutely nothing was wasted. They rigged up an aerial on poles strapped to the two chimneys on top of the house and this was wired into a special "earthing switch" which allowed it to be connected to ground in the event of an electrical storm. This big aerial gave the boys the ability to listen to longwave stations in other states and shortwave stations all over the world - but only at night when reception was much better. The family did have a working AWA valve radio at the time, but this was a time when the wonder of how and why things worked fascinated them most.

Their mother was thoroughly "underwhelmed" when her sons set up wiring between their bedrooms so they could send each other messages in morse code. They continued to learn as they bought bits and pieces from the local junk shop and used whatever they could buy or scrounge, to build, modify and create all kinds of electronic gadgets.

One of these boys became an aircraft instrument fitter and then a computer engineer from 1965 until his retirement and the other became a production manager in telephones and communications and in 1962 had the opportunity to change direction and become a computer programmer. He retired as a senior systems analyst.

This reminiscent senior was listening to the radio one day when an advertisement came to air describing a great deal on "**A full HD LCD LED TV with HDMI and USB and HDD**". After he stopped laughing about what his parents would make of all that if they somehow returned to earth for a day; he "translated" the features of this SMART TV for his wife, telling her; "*It is a full high definition liquid crystal display, light emitting diode (back lighting) television with high definition media interface and universal serial bus and hard disk drive!*"

Of course this makes us all chuckle, but it does also remind us, that we still have so much to learn and so much fun to experience. It also makes us aware that staying connected with technology helps us to stay

On the 14th December, 2015 the **Assistant Minister for Social Services, Alan Tudge MP** launched the **Federal Government's new Carer Gateway** which aims to make it easier for carers to access practical information and advice. This new **Integrated Plan for Carers** will make accessing the nearest existing support services through a national phone service, website and an interactive service finder much more convenient and it will also help to reach out to carers who might not currently identify as carers or know that support is available to them.

Mr Tudge said that the new Carer Gateway would make a real difference to the way carers access support. He also said; "Many carers do not have the time to go searching across multiple sites for reliable information on how to access local respite services or social support. Now carers will have an

easy to access gateway to help connect them with the existing local services they need."

Carers can call 1800 422 737, Monday to Friday between 8am and 6pm, and speak to a helpful and professional Australian-based team who can help with information, and provide links to local services.

National Carers Week 2016 will run from 16-22 October 2016. Carers Week aims to raise awareness of carers, the caring role and relationships, and carer supports and services. There is a separate website available for Carers in each state.

Are you ready for Digital Money?



Would you like to use money which doesn't actually exist? Well there are now currencies which are created by computer programs and being used for buying and selling goods and services. Two examples are "Bitcoins" and "Perfect Money".

These currencies are generated by computer algorithms, and exist only in computer strings of characters somewhere in the Ethernet. You can buy Bitcoins from banks and have them "transferred" to your "Digital wallet", which you must create first, together with a digital money address on the Internet. From there you can spend them with a growing number of retailers.

Do you think that sounds far fetched? Just think of "real

money", it hardly exists any more. You hand over a credit card and a transaction occurs. Neither you or the seller actually handles or sees any money, it is just a transfer of digital information from your "digital wallet" - your credit card.
