Human Rights Commissioner Edward Santow is leading an Australian Human Rights Commission Project exploring the impact of emerging technology. Commissioner Santow talks with the **Australian Seniors Computer Clubs Association** about protecting our rights in an era of rapid technological change. **Emerging technologies are becoming a part of life, should we embrace them without question, be selective or be afraid?**



ES: Technologies may be used for good or ill. That's as true of old technology, like a knife, as it is for new technology, like artificial intelligence. There is no doubt we will continue to see new innovations continue to emerge and affect our lives in different ways. We want to encourage people to embrace the positive, and reasonably question and be sceptical of applications of technologies that compromise our human rights and values. A robust and protective framework that works to prevent dangerous design and use will assist the community to be able to embrace the positive aspects of technology and not be fearful.

Seniors computer clubs rarely use desktop computers, a majority of members want to learn how to use emerging technology such as iPad and tablets and smartphones. But what of more invasive technology?

ES: The Internet of Things (IoT) is rapidly growing. The IoT is any device with an on and off switch that can be connected to the internet and send and receive data. Not long ago, only classic desktop computers met this description. Now your phone, watch, tablet or even kitchen appliance can be connected to the internet. This can make some parts of our lives more convenient – you can work anywhere, order your shopping on your phone etc. But do we want to be connected to the internet 24/7 and through everyday devices? And where does all of this data go and who has access to it? As with many questions posed by emerging technologies, we also have to ask ourselves what kind of society we want to be. We want technology to serve us - not the other way around.

What about inclusive technologies for people with disability?

ES: Just as everyone should be able to access our education system, public transport and buildings, technology also should be accessible to all. If technology is increasingly the main gateway to participate in the core elements of individual and community life, this gateway must accommodate all members of the Australian community, regardless of disability, race, religion, gender or other characteristic.

As part of the Human Rights and Technology Project, the Commission is exploring how to encourage the design, development and implementation of accessible technology. We are examining strategies like industry measures that promote accessibility; government standards; education and awareness raising; procurement policies that set minimum standards for accessibility in large organisations and government; and institutional bodies that monitor and enforce accessible and inclusive technology.

What about the impact of social media on free speech and democracy?

ES: Freedom of expression, including the right to seek, receive and impart information and ideas of all kinds, is an important human right that must be protected and promoted. It is, however, subject to restrictions, such as the rights and reputations of others, national security and public order. This is especially the case when applied to the ubiquitous world of social media and the internet. Social media can provide opportunities for people to seek and receive information and ideas in vast quantities. But social media also brings new risks that others' rights will be infringed. It is essential that the right to freedom of expression is maintained on these platforms, with necessary measures that restrict violation of others' human rights.

A joint video conference between GTF BC in Sydney, SWADE's Natika in Kununurra, ASCCA's Jenny from Walpole who stopped off at Manjimup CRC en route to Perth and Linkwest's CEO Jane Chilcott in Perth allowed for a most amicable arrangement to be negotiated and agreed to. The result will see ASCCA SWADE continue in the same manner and direction to the end of our contract. The start date for Linkwest's similar program delivery will be delayed until 1st November. Both organisations will use November as the transition period of handover. Jenny stated after the video linkup that the outcome demonstrated the firm bond already established between the two peak bodies, with Linkwest being the first partnership formed by SWADE at the outset of their Be Connected program delivery.

For several weeks during August and September Natika is taking a well earned break and is taking a lightning tour, with her husband, around the USA. Considering she is such a techno-head she has with her all manner of technological devices, to deal with any contingency on their travels. Her iPad is loaded with the latest travel Apps and her iPhone has a special SIM card that allows for unlimited phone and data access in the USA as well as providing a facility where family and friends can phone her at no charge. I'm sure she will return with many ideas she can share with us all.

So, while she's away I have been holding the ASCCA_SWADE fort pretty much single handedly, and I've been thankful things are a little quiet in this the wettest and coldest month of the year here in WA. On the drawing board for the first week in September is a video conferencing session under Train the Trainer where I will deliver an interactive tutorial in preparing a Powerpoint electronic presentation and saving it as an MP4 video format, able to be played, via a USB memory stick on any equipment that has a USB port—TV, Computer, even an Apple TV. The Powerpoint program has seen great advances after Office 2010 and congratulations to Microsoft for providing the functions that beat the old method of having to convert the movie files.

On a final note, we are pleased to confirm that ASCCA-SWADE is well on track to attain its committed goal of registering 250 learners in the Be Connected program.
