**EXCERPT from The Tacoma News Tribune, April 11, 1953**

PASADENA, - AP—The telephone of the future?

Mark R Sullivan, San Francisco, president and director of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co., said in an address Thursday night :

“Just what form the future of telephone will take is, of course, pure speculation. Here is my prophecy :

“In its final development, the telephone will be carried about by the individual, perhaps as we carry a watch today. It probably will require no dial or equivalent, and I think the users will be able to see each other, if they want, as they talk.

“Who knows but what it may actually translate from one language to another?”

"She was in her element matching students with trainers and finding the right place for everyone."

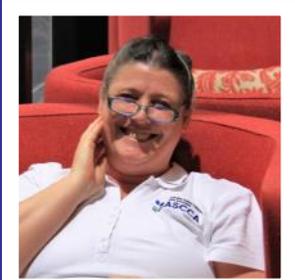
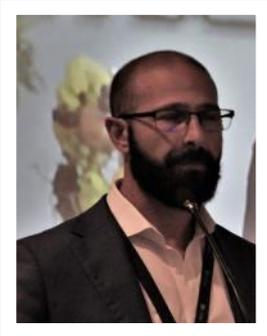

The positions of Secretary and Treasurer will be appointed at a later time. Nan welcomed the incoming Board, including the two new Directors, and said that she looked forward to a very productive year ahead.



### Three Shades of SWADE

This was the catchy title of the session presented at the Conference by **ASCCA**'s Nan Bosler, Jennifer Willcox and Natika Hawes-Wright who separately gave an account of the year that was in regard to the various **SWADE** projects each is involved with and currently being undertaken in Western Australia, Northern Territory and New South Wales.

WA has been concentrating on supporting the establishment of new **ASCCA** affiliated Clubs; NT is winding down its one year Community Capacity Building project in registering learners at a number of Network Partner organisations in the Be Connected program, with the bonus of the establishment of five new **ASCCA** affiliated Clubs; and NSW has begun its Capacity Building project in registering Digital Mentors within Network Partner organisations, again within the Be Connected program. The initial group who undertook the Digital Mentor training were students from various faculties of Sydney University who have formed Square One Skills Inc., to oversee the volunteer tutoring planned to be delivered into nominated Nursing Homes in the Sydney area. This program continues until June 2020 and plans are in place to pick up the pace in engaging people to be trained as Digital Mentors, within **ASCCA** affiliated Clubs and Retirement Villages. Watch this space, and open the door wide, when we come knocking!

Jess Wilson, National Director, Good Things Foundation Australia, outlined the various grant opportunities on offer to Network Partners and highlighted the benefits for these organisations to take advantage of the Be Connected on-line lessons available free to all senior learners who register.
